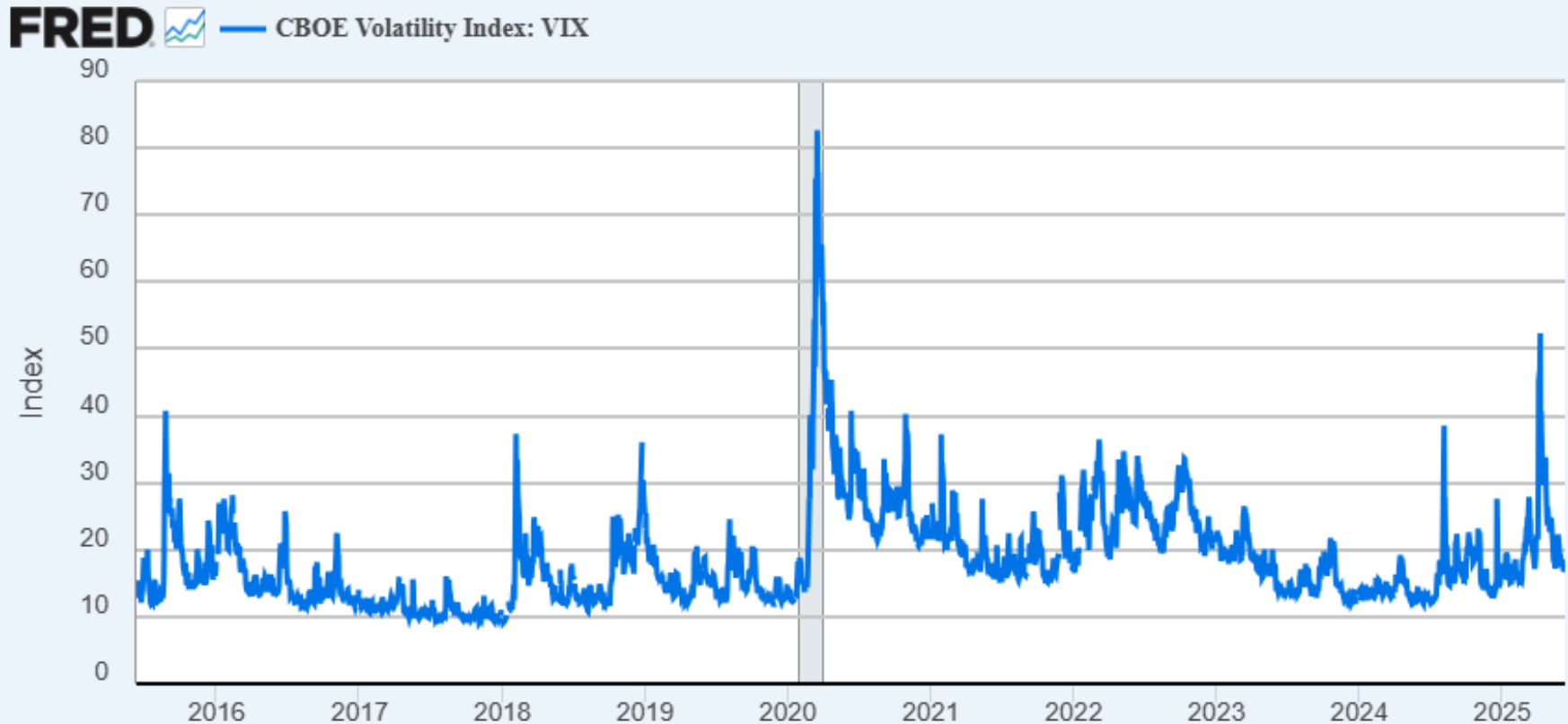

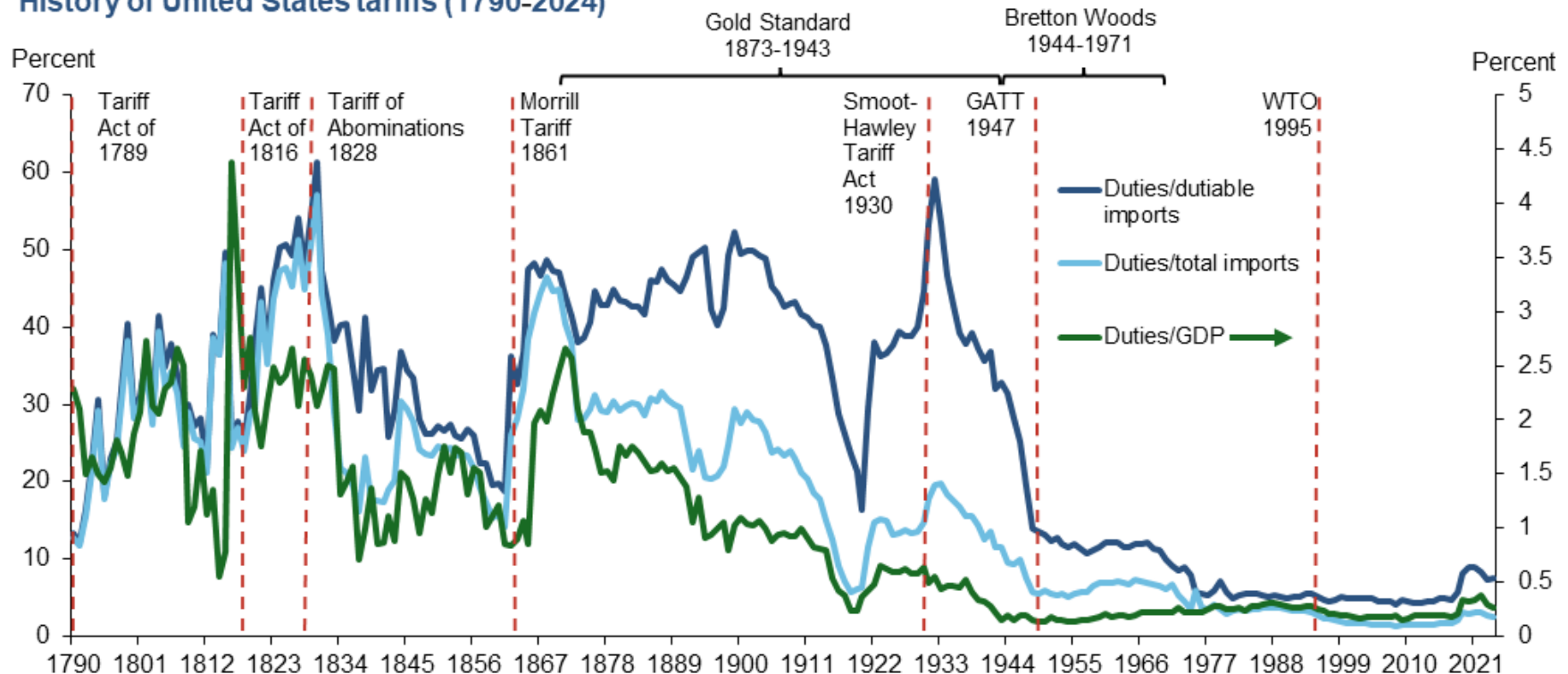

— Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers: All Items in U.S. City Average




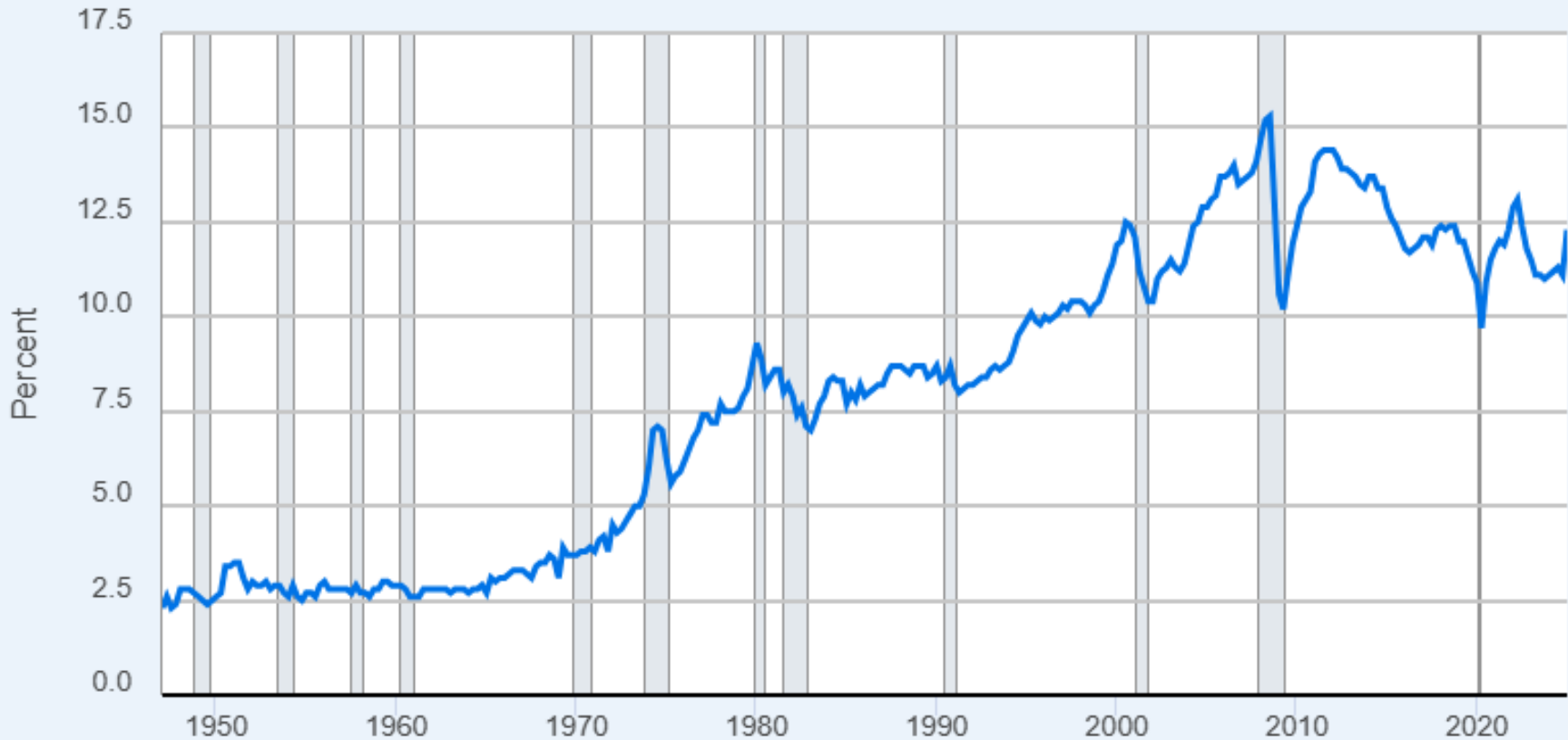

# Employer Reactions - Staffing

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## Widespread Hesitancy in Hiring and Staffing

Across all Districts, there were widespread comments about uncertainty delaying hiring. Many employers are adopting a "wait and see" approach regarding staffing levels. Some contacts stated that their staffing plans had not changed since the start of the year, while others indicated they have reduced their hiring plans.

Dallas: Contacts noted that hiring was at a standstill, with many companies instituting a hiring freeze. A headhunting firm noted that multiple clients recently paused on making offers for senior managerial positions. Energy contacts planned to reduce staffing in the months ahead as they rein in spending. Numerous contacts across industries noted that higher tariffs and elevated uncertainty weighed on hiring plans.



# Employer Reactions - Investments

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## Delayed or Reduced Capital Investment

Uncertainty, particularly related to tariffs, is causing businesses to put investment plans on hold or scale them back.

Kansas City: Businesses described a cautious approach to capital expenditures, looking only to pursue "no regret" investments that have shorter payback periods, are smaller in scale, and are less sensitive to policy developments. Nearly a third of manufacturing firms and a quarter of service firms decreased capital spending plans. A machinery producer noted that "tariff uncertainty has made long-term planning difficult".



# Employer Reactions - Pricing

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## Adjustment of Pricing and Supply Chain Strategies

In response to uncertainty, particularly tariffs, businesses are adjusting how they quote prices and manage their supply chains.

San Francisco: Some firms explicitly included a separate tariff line for items or contingencies in their price quotes and contracts. One contact observed that price increases that had been implemented in anticipation of certain tariffs were not rolled back once those tariffs were removed. Some manufacturers were able to negotiate sharing the cost of tariffs with their vendors abroad.

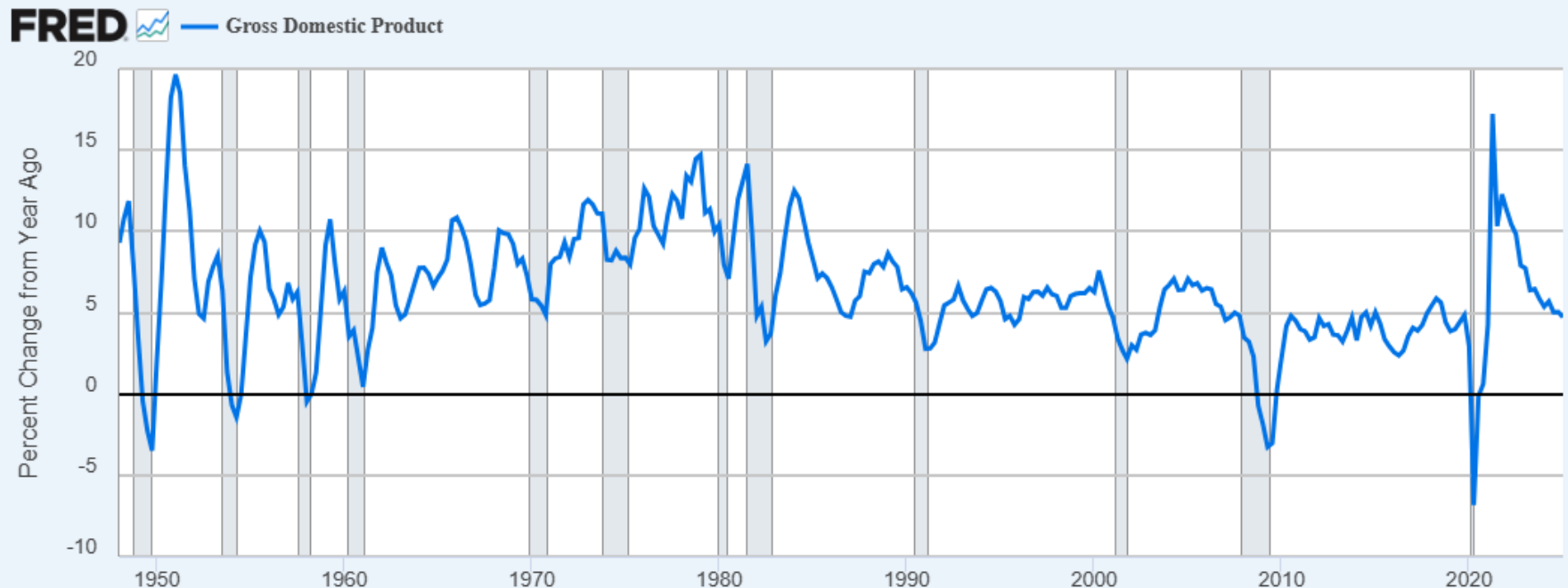

Slowdown in economic output, possible declines in GDP.



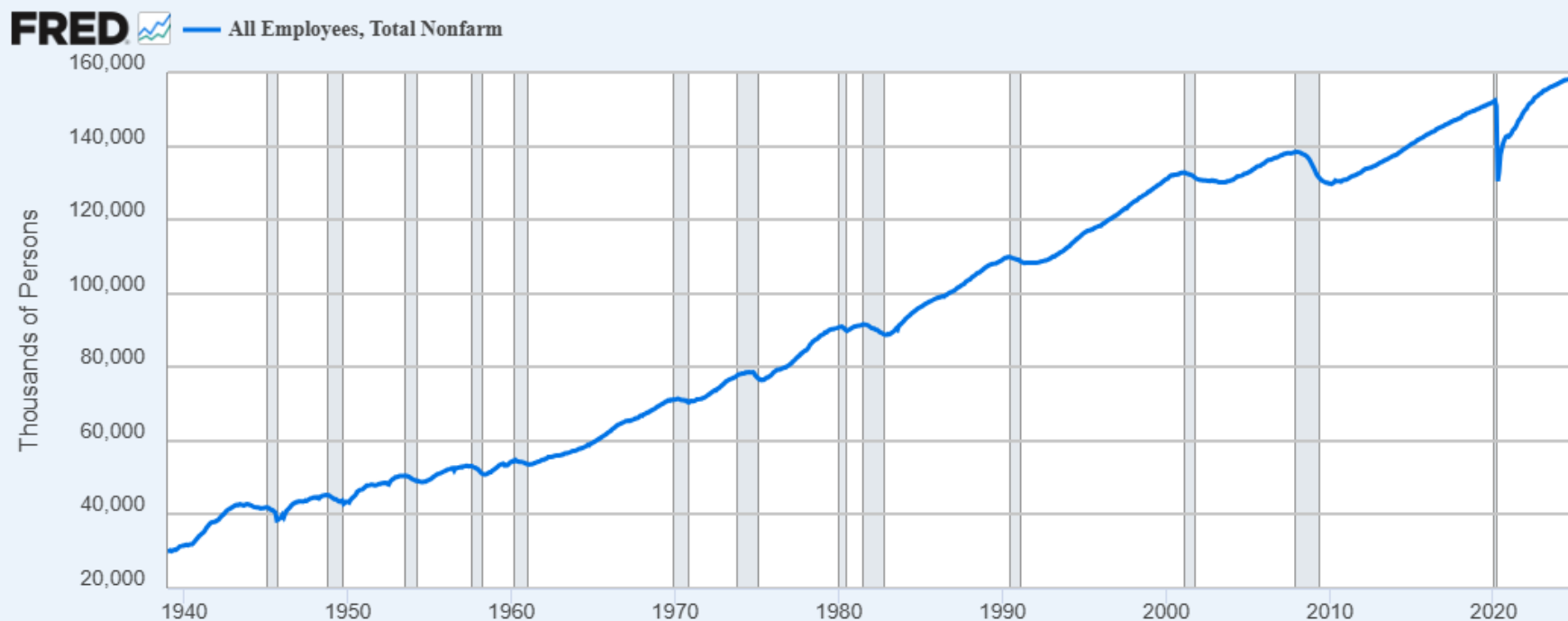

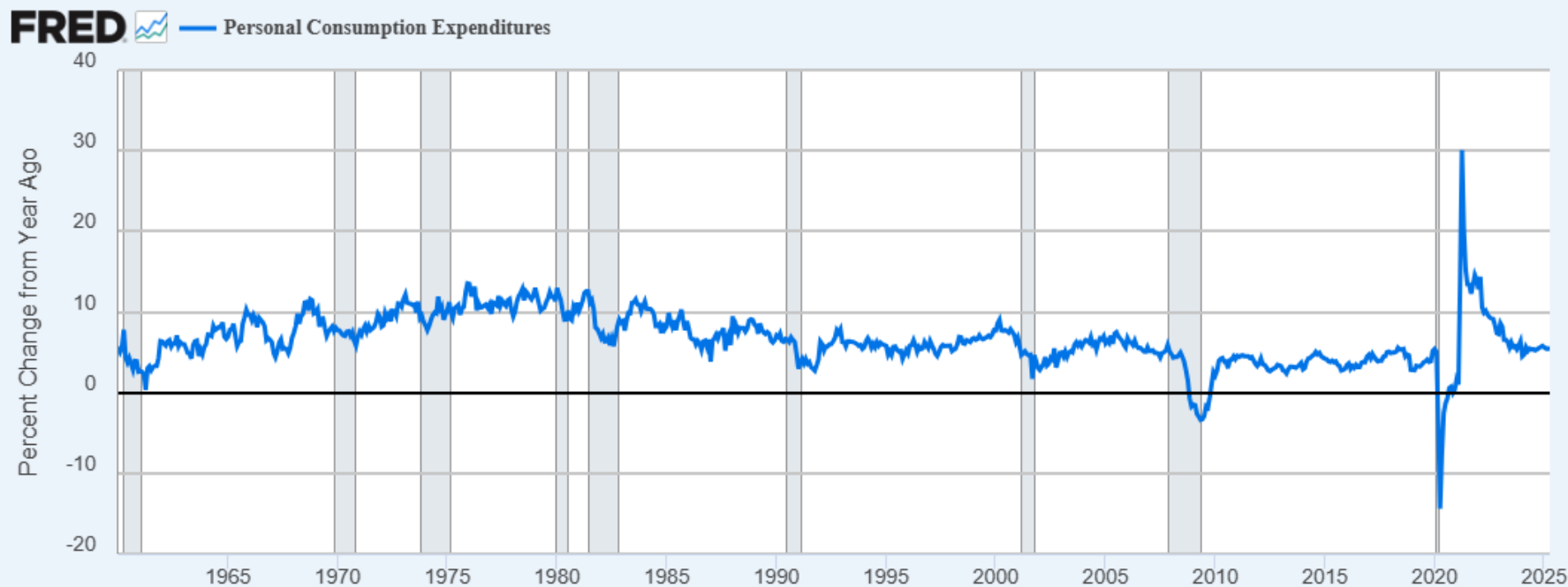

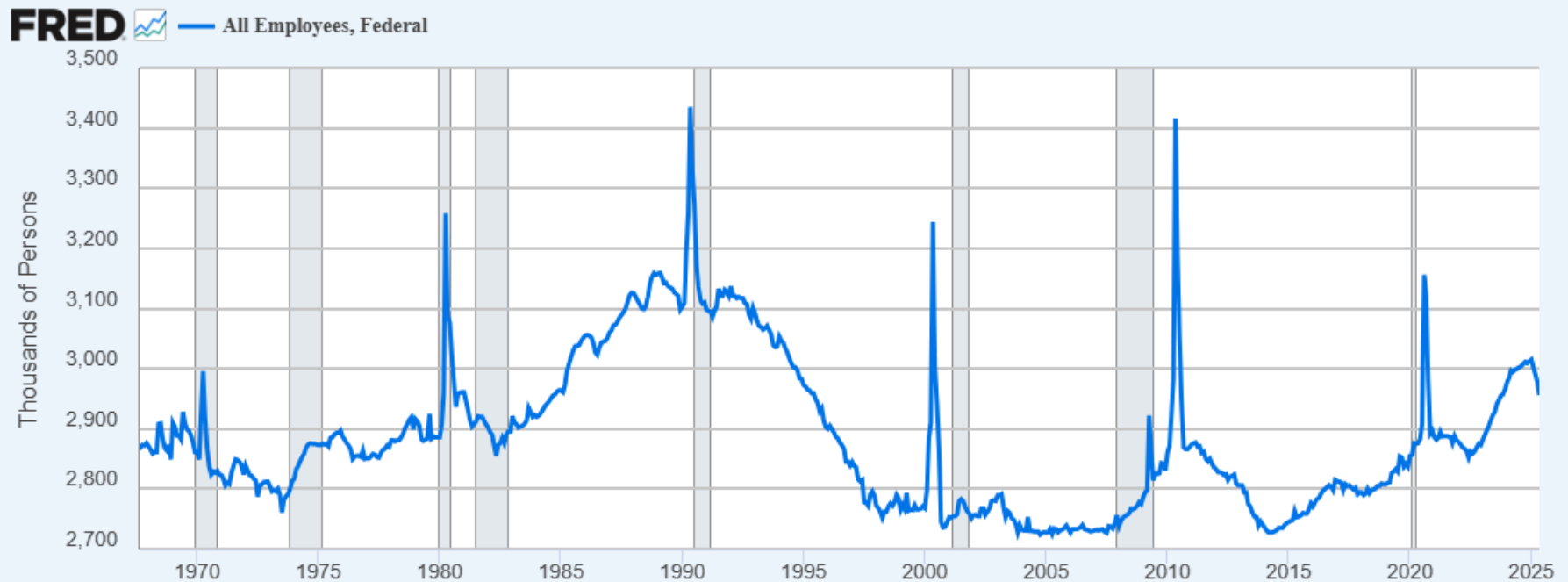

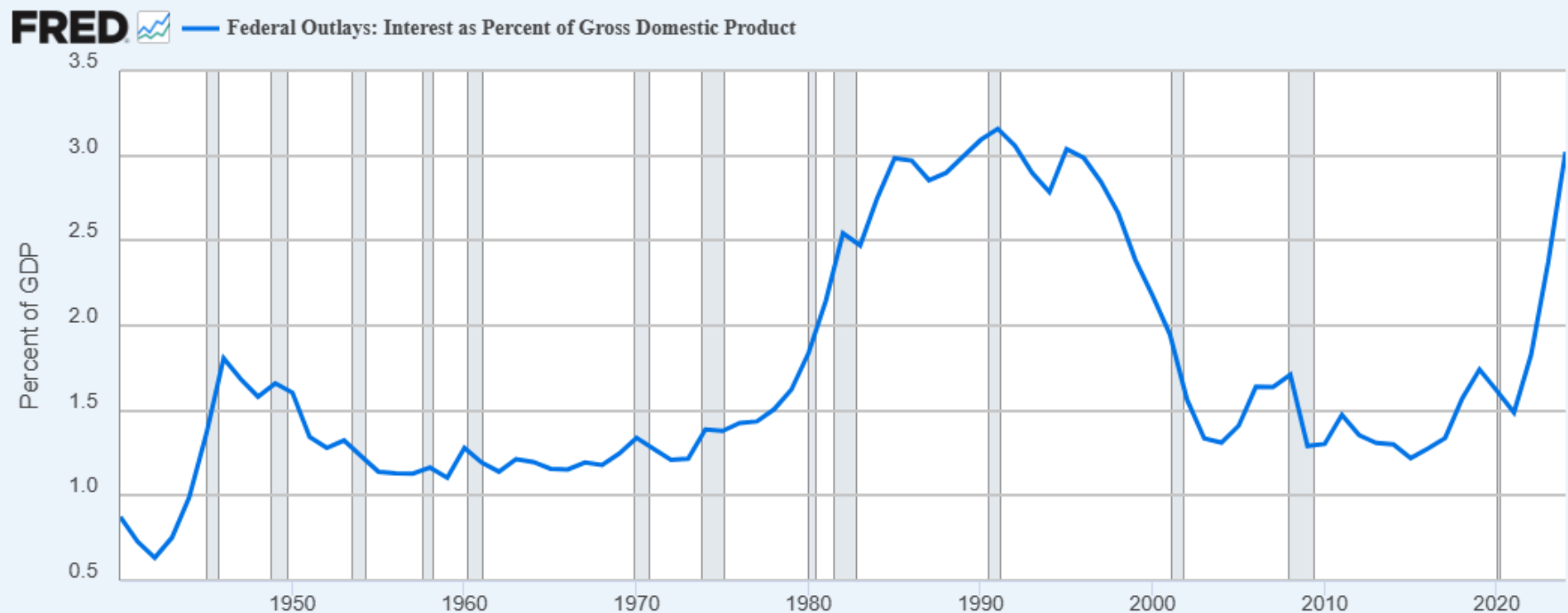

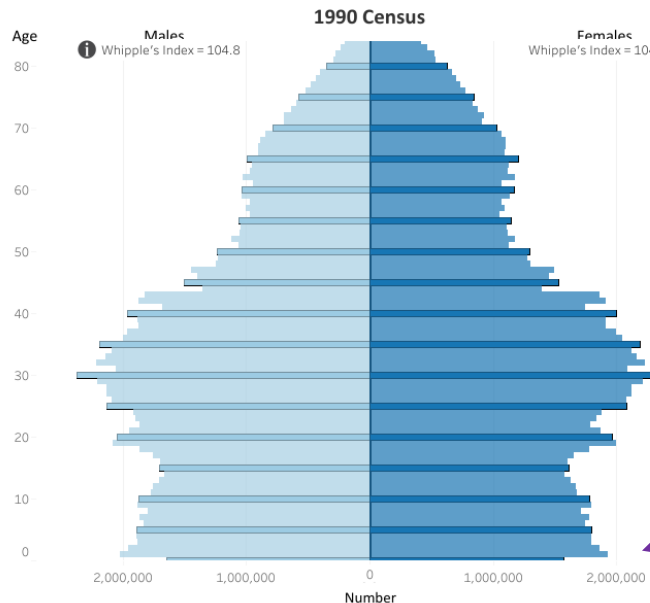

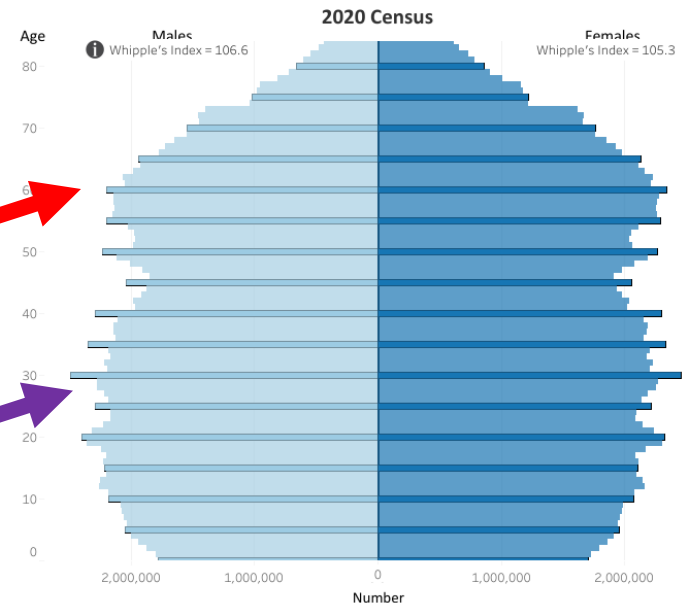

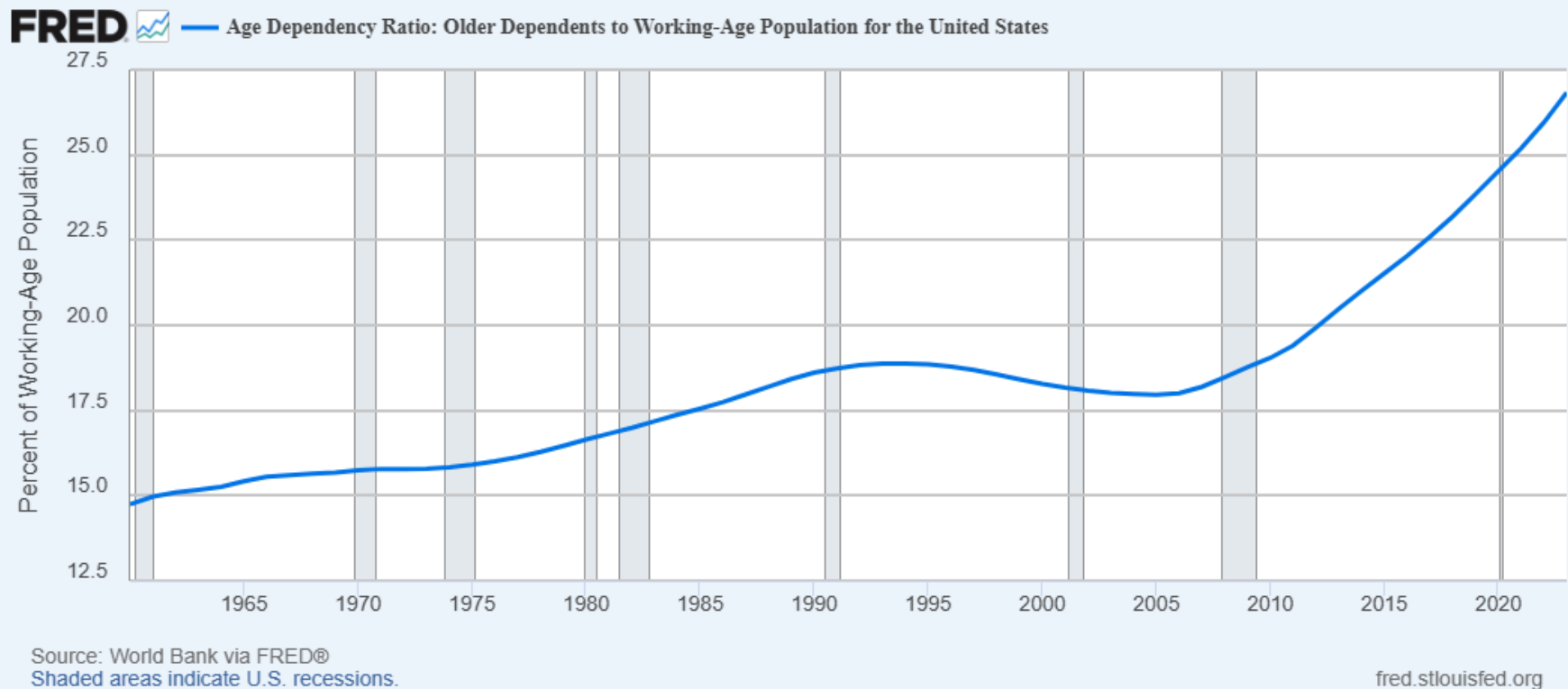

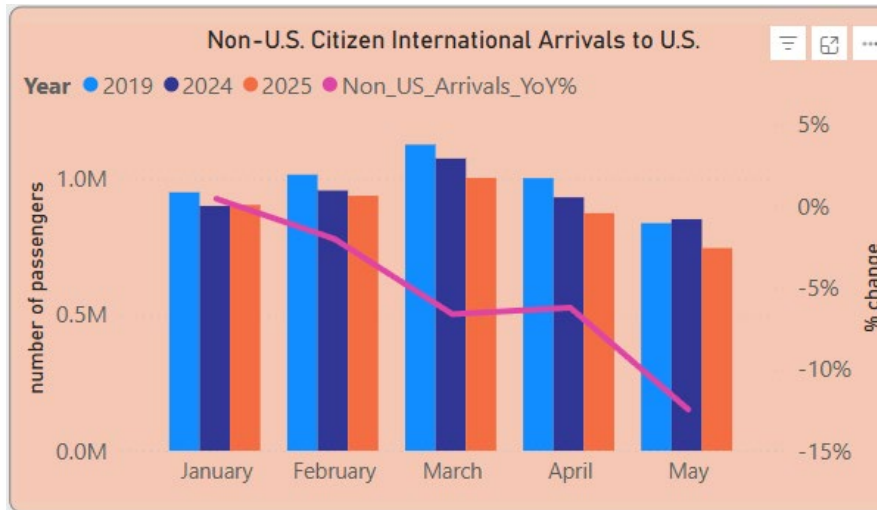

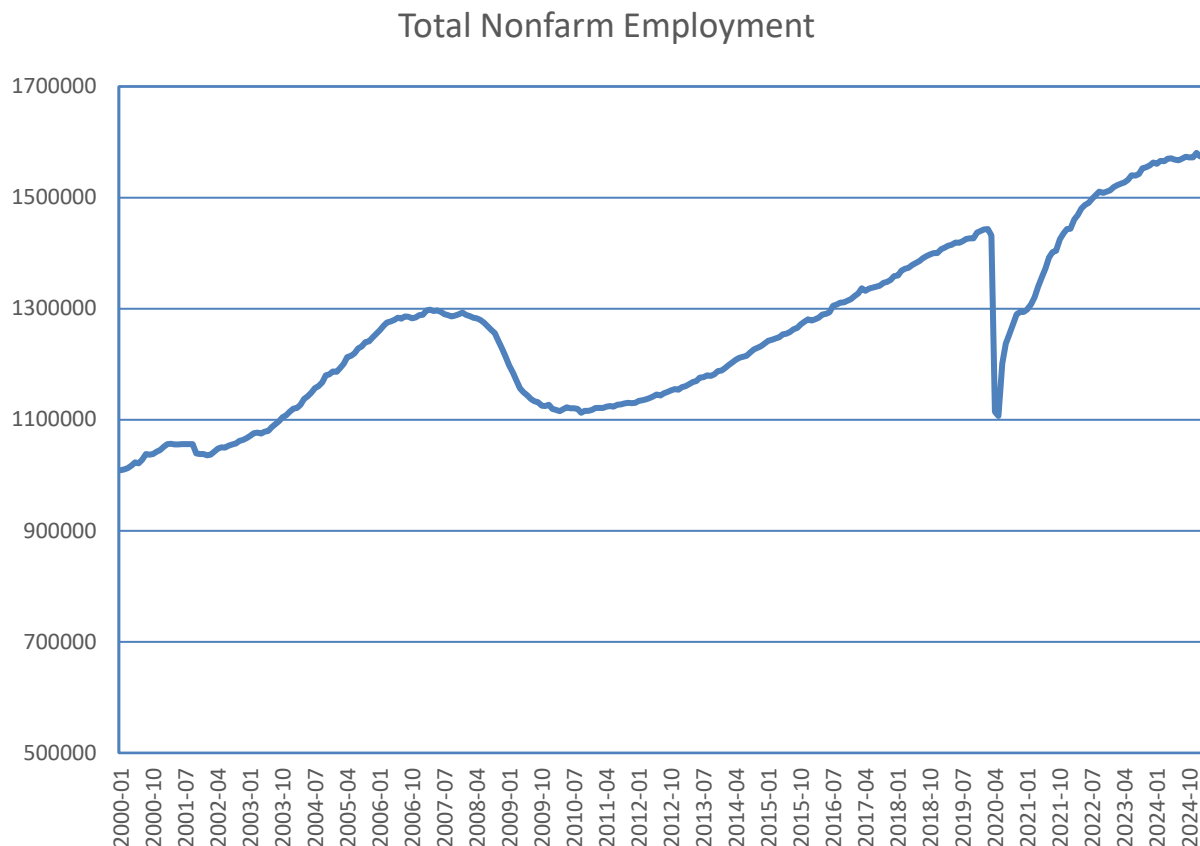

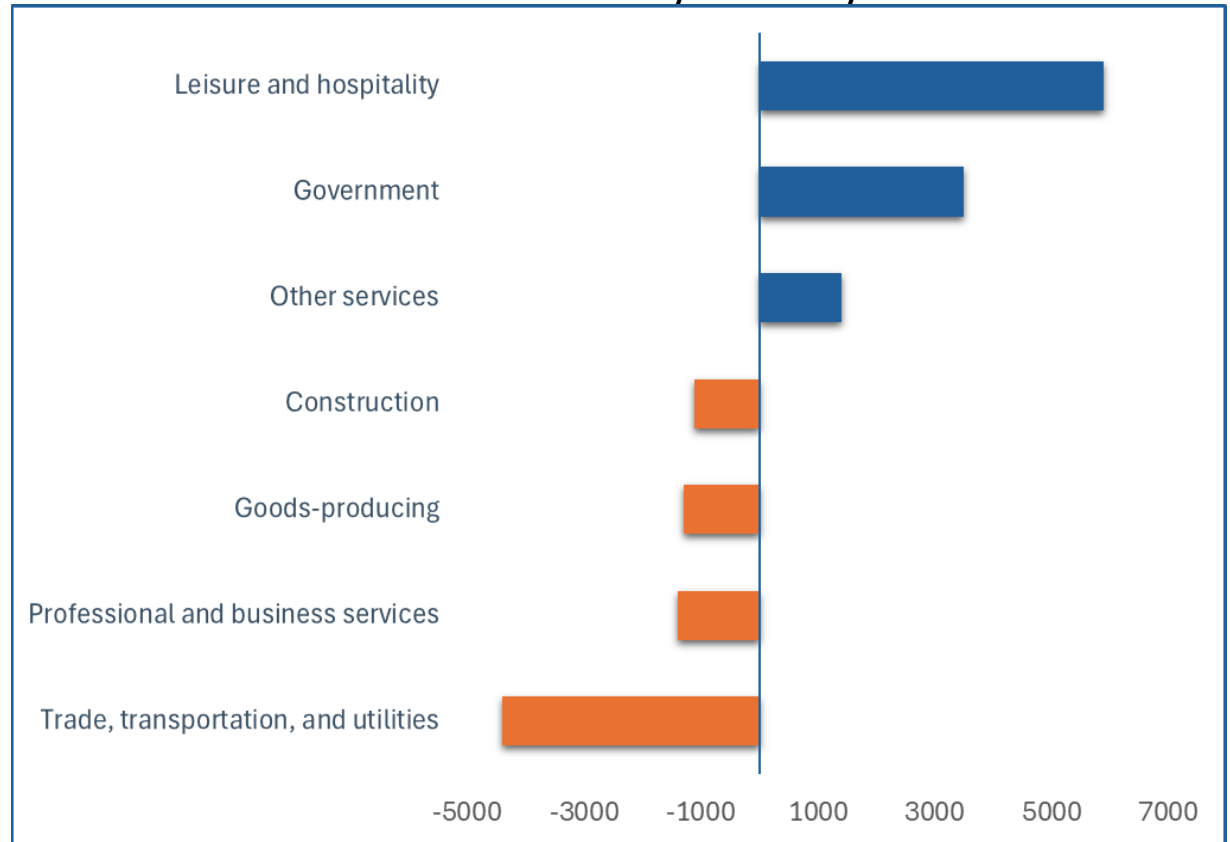

# State Unemployment Rate

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- ❑ 5.6% Unemployment Rate (SA<sup>1</sup>) in April
  - ❑ Declined from March; up from 5.4% a year ago
    - ❑ off from a recession peak of 30.5% (*USA 14.8%*)
    - ❑ in absolute terms, unemployment totaled 93,534; off from a recession high of 448,437
    - ❑ labor force has increased by 16,775 year to date; limits downward pressure on the unemployment rate
  - ❑ compares to a 4.2% rate for the U.S.— 1.4 percentage point(pp) higher
    - ❑ was more than 16 pp higher at height of recession

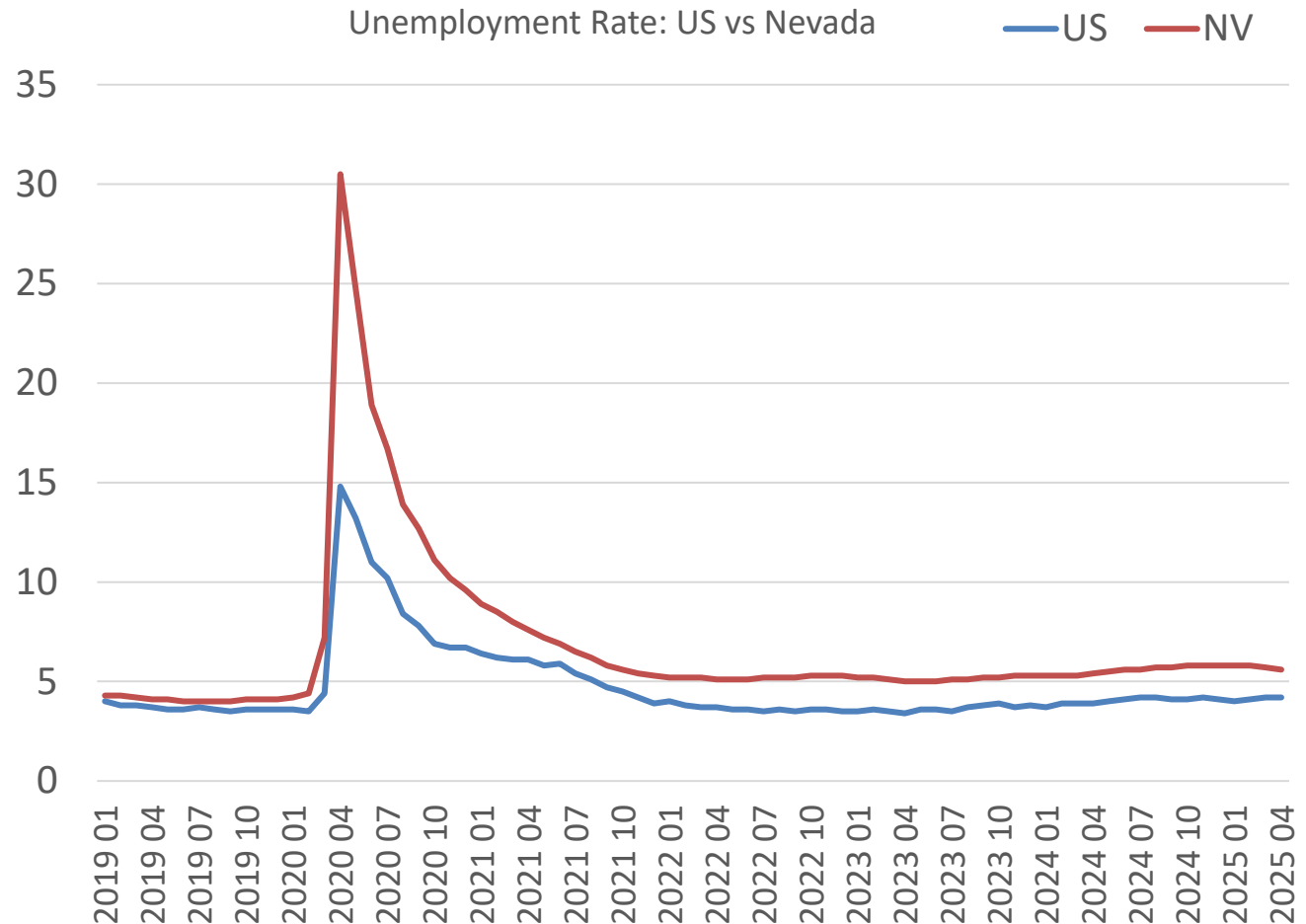

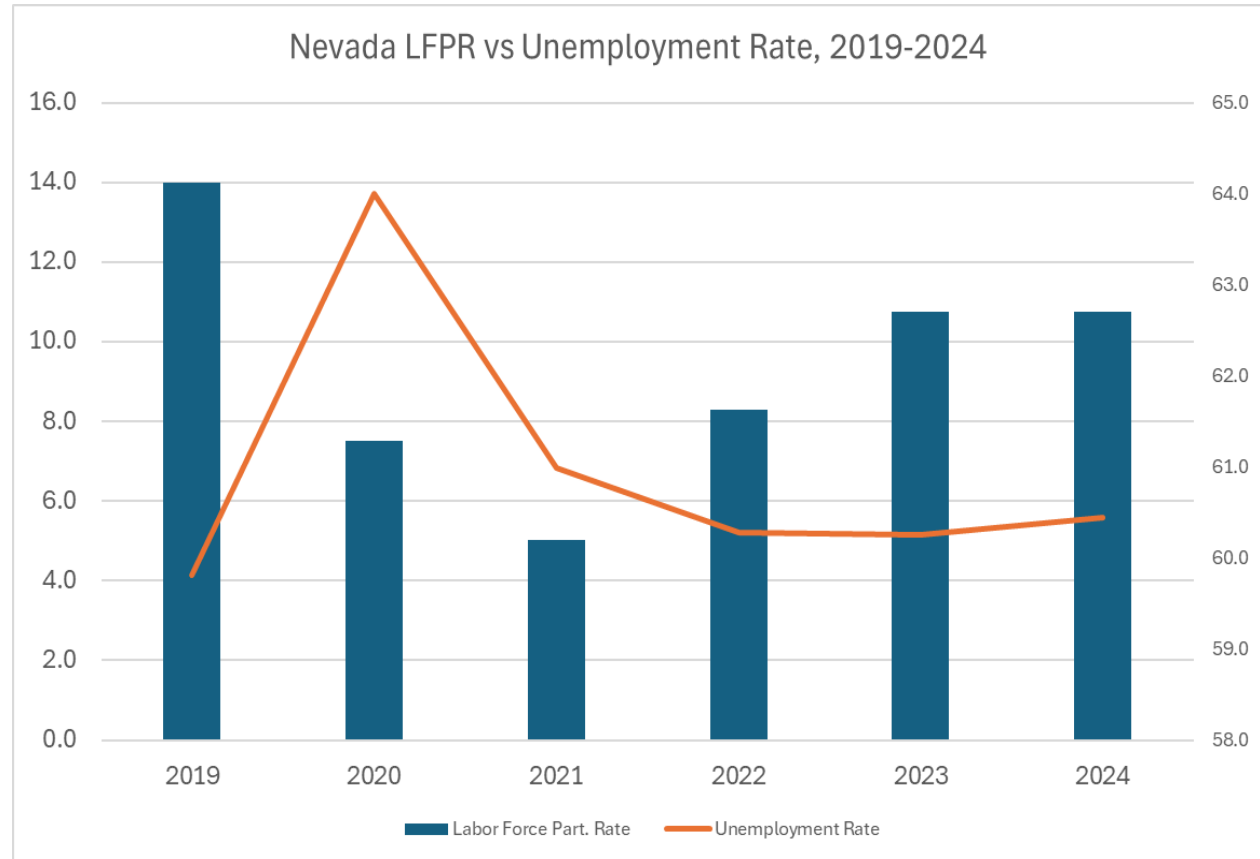


# Nevada LFPR and Unemployment Rate, 2019-2024

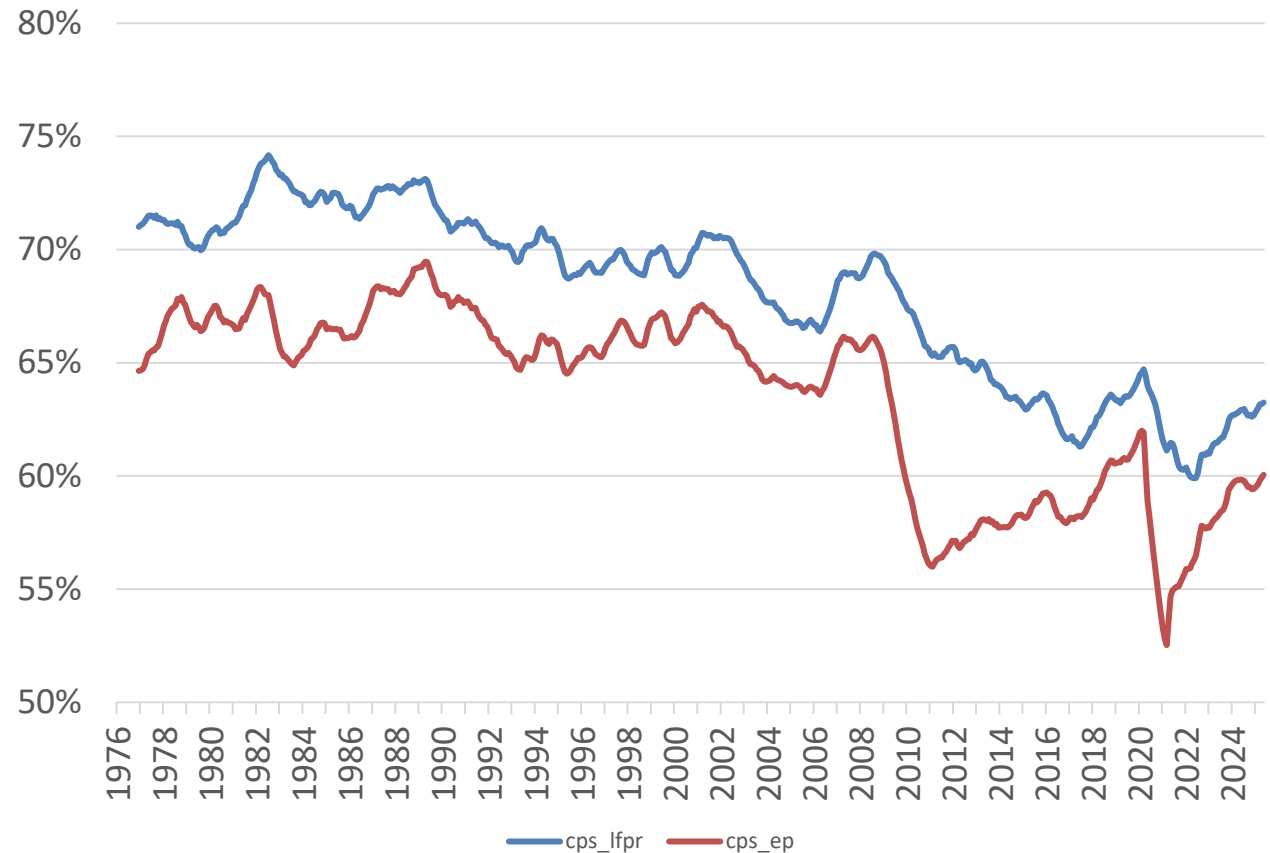

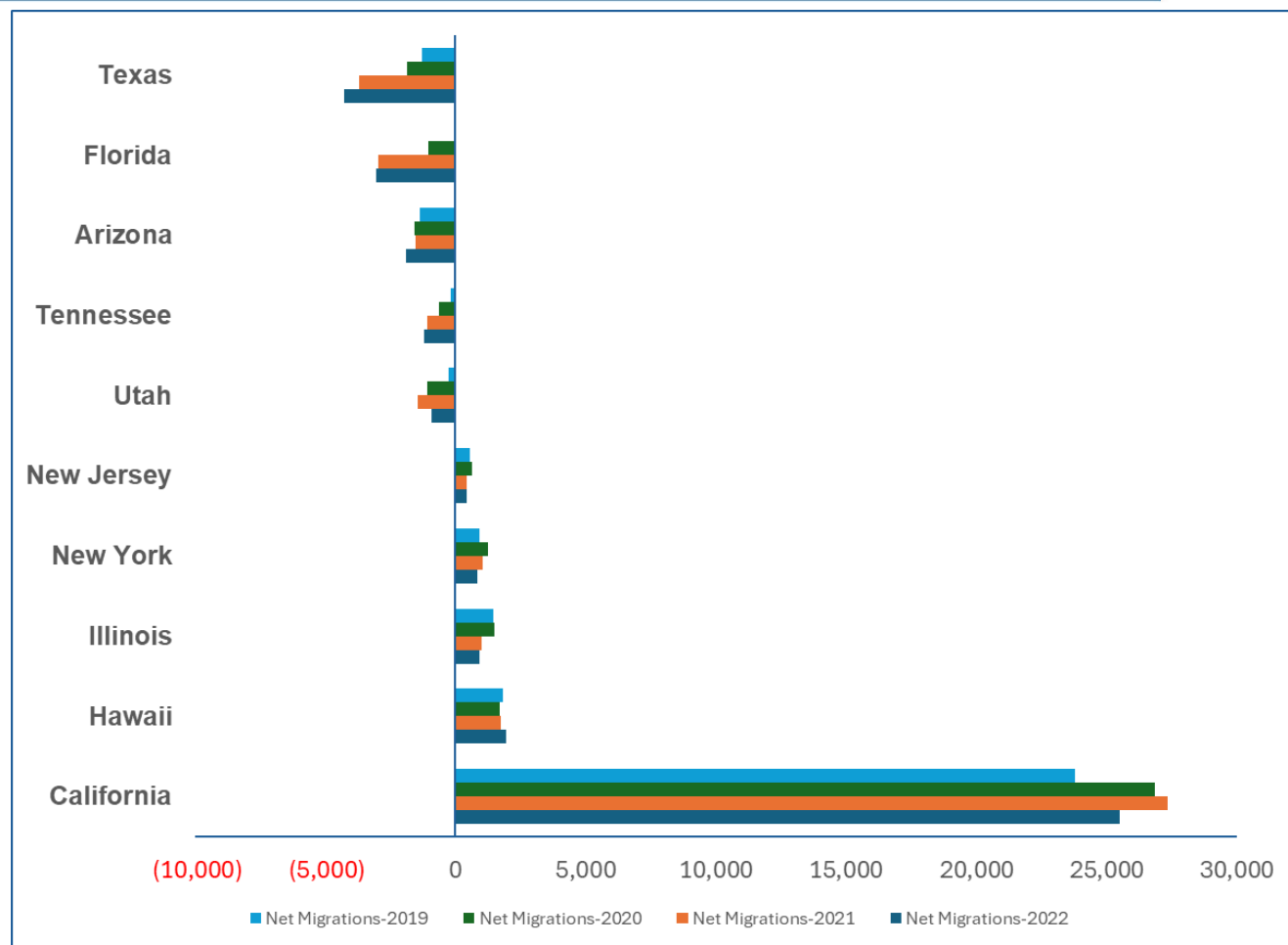


# Migration Trends in Nevada, 2019-2022

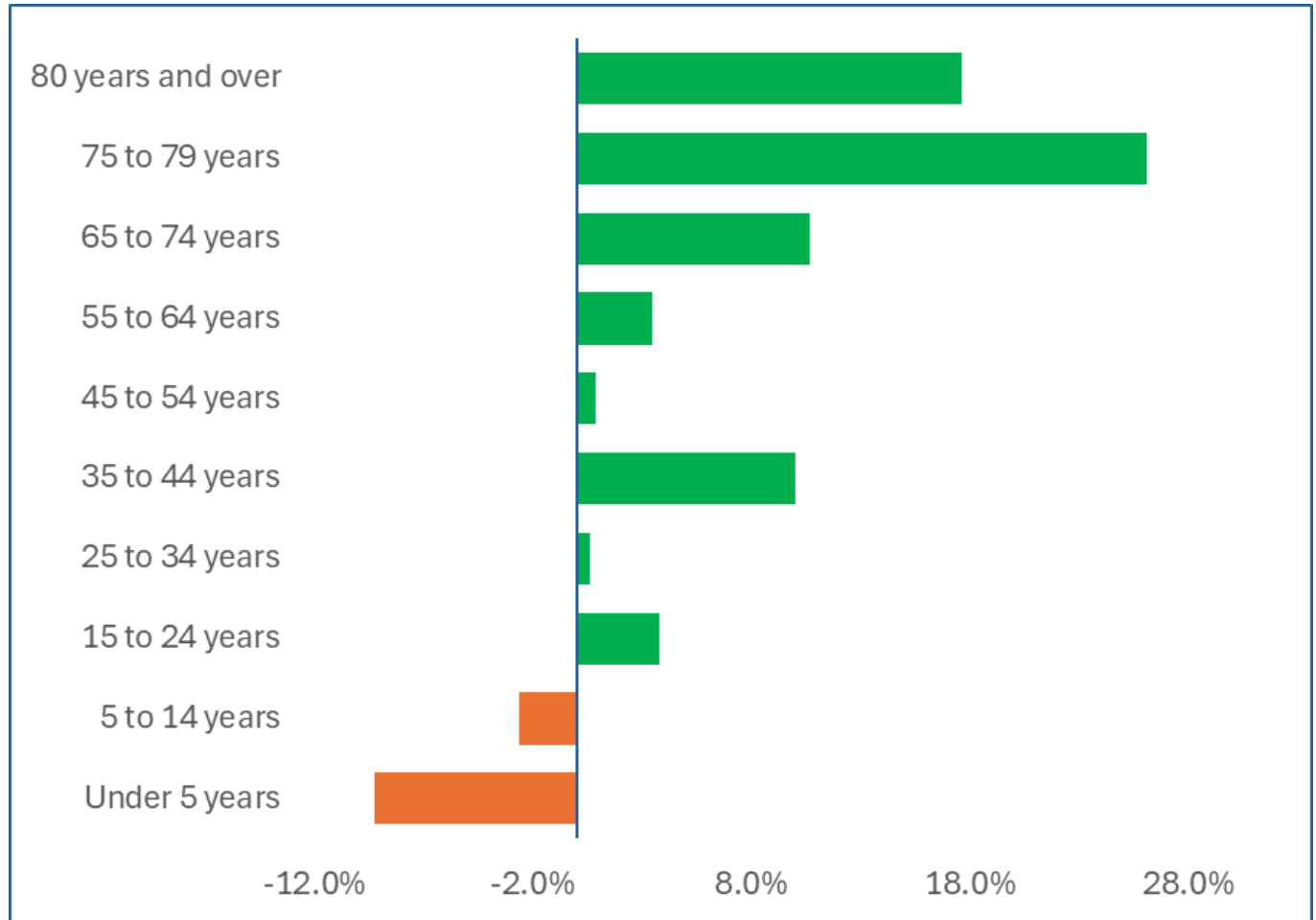


# Nevada's Age Demographics are Changing (2019-2024)

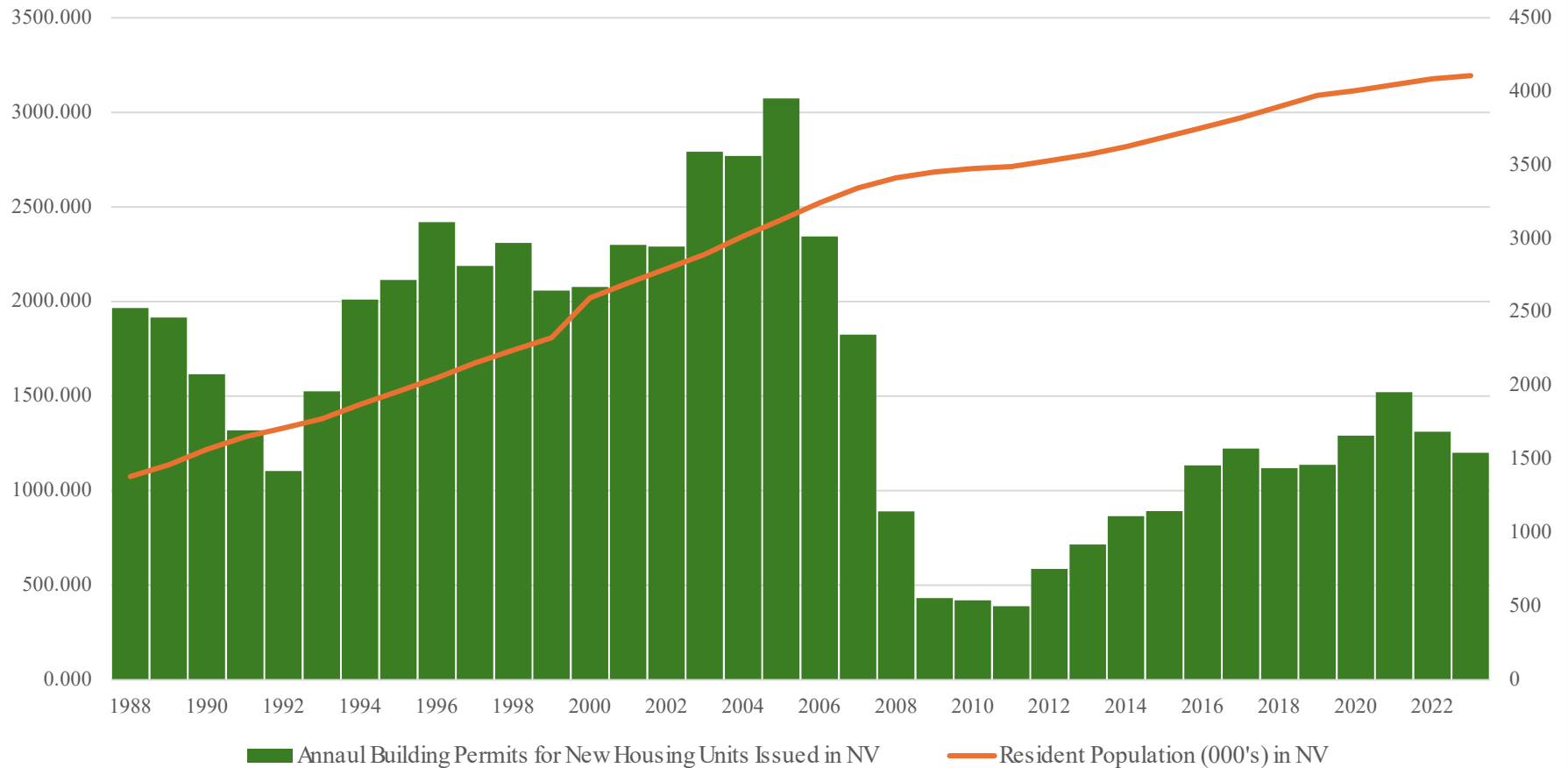

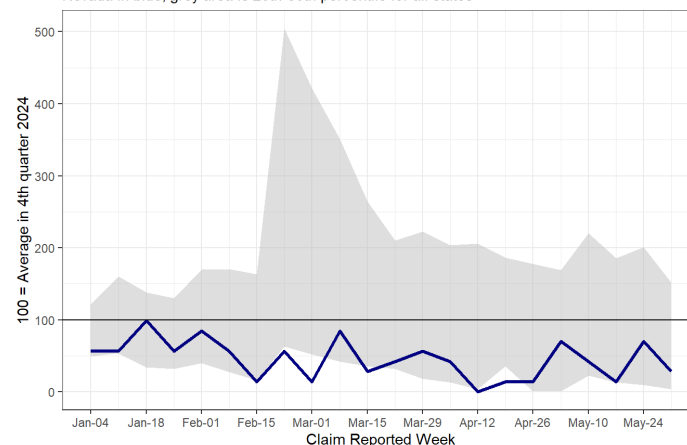

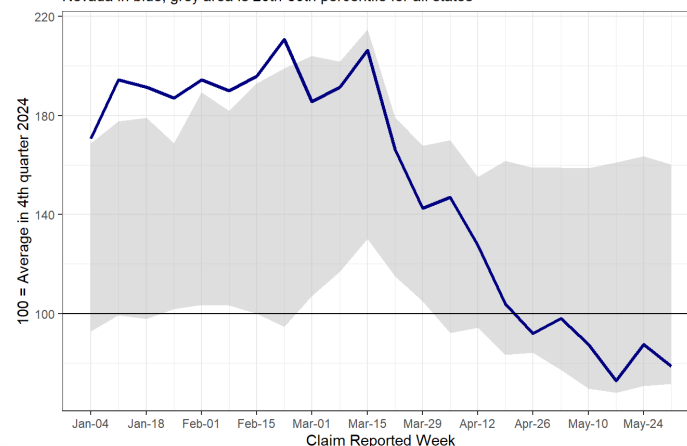
## Initial Claims for Unemployment from Federal Workers

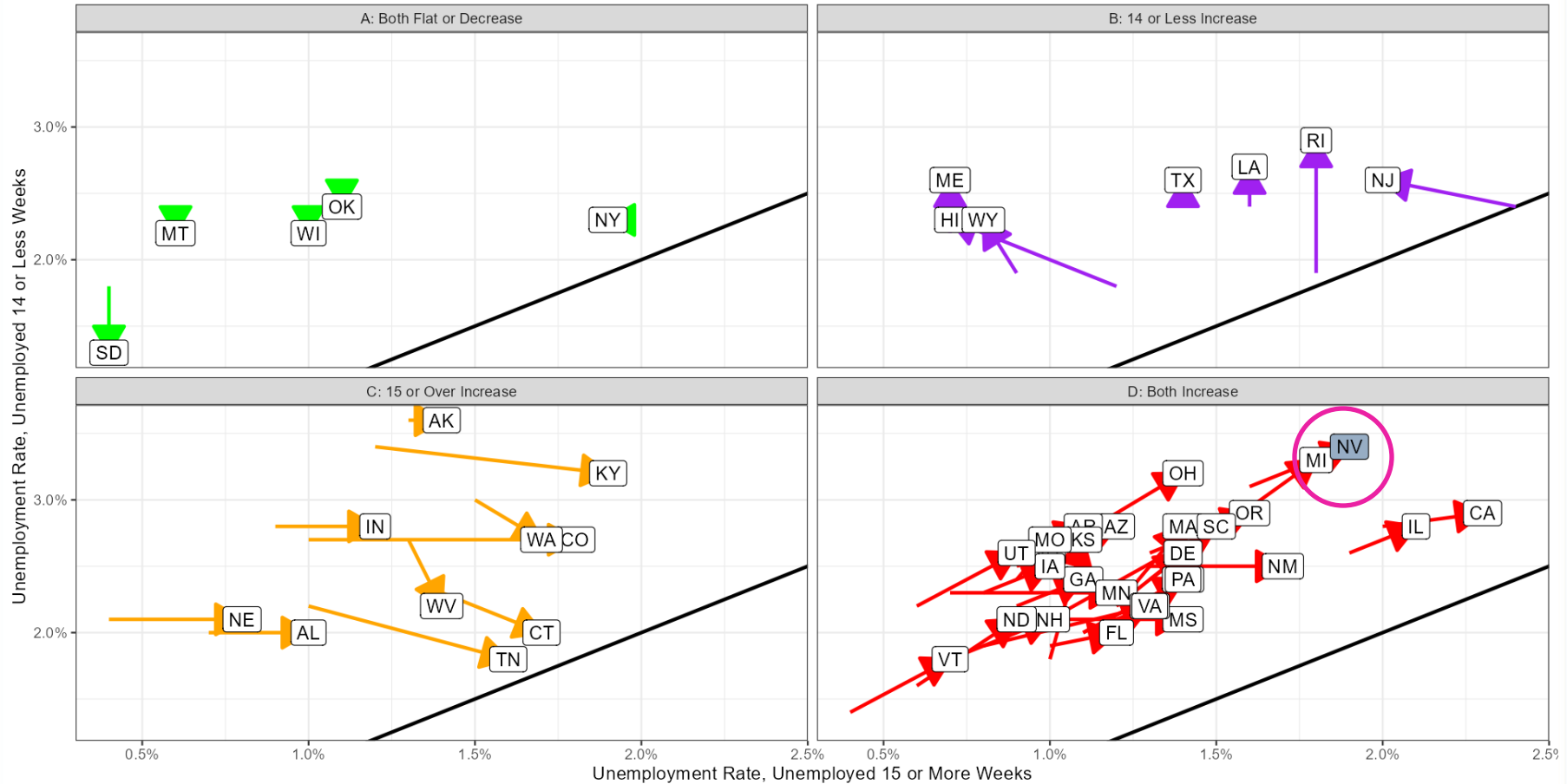

Black line represents balance between unemployment duration categories



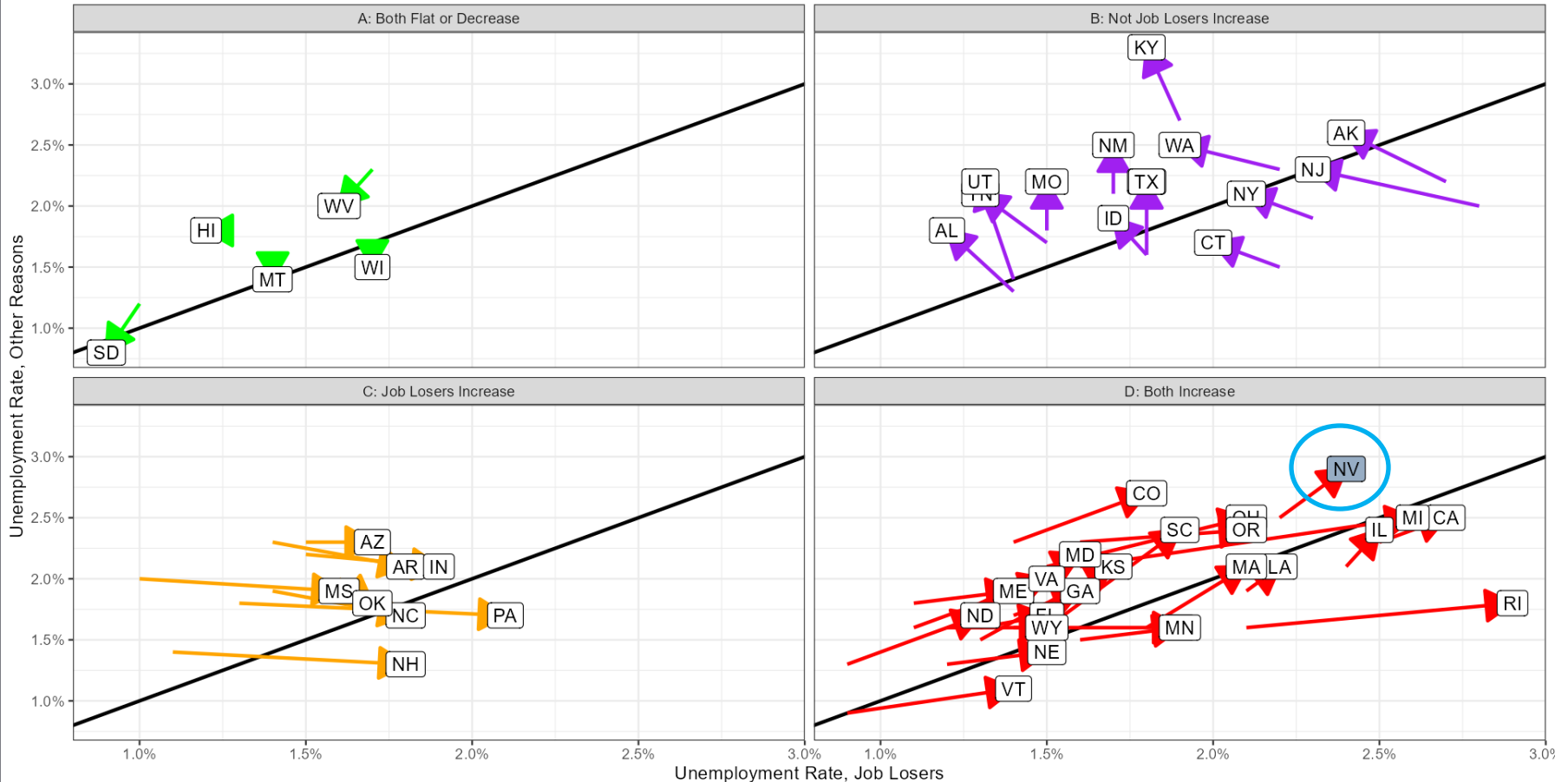

Black line represents balance between unemployment due to job loss or other reasons



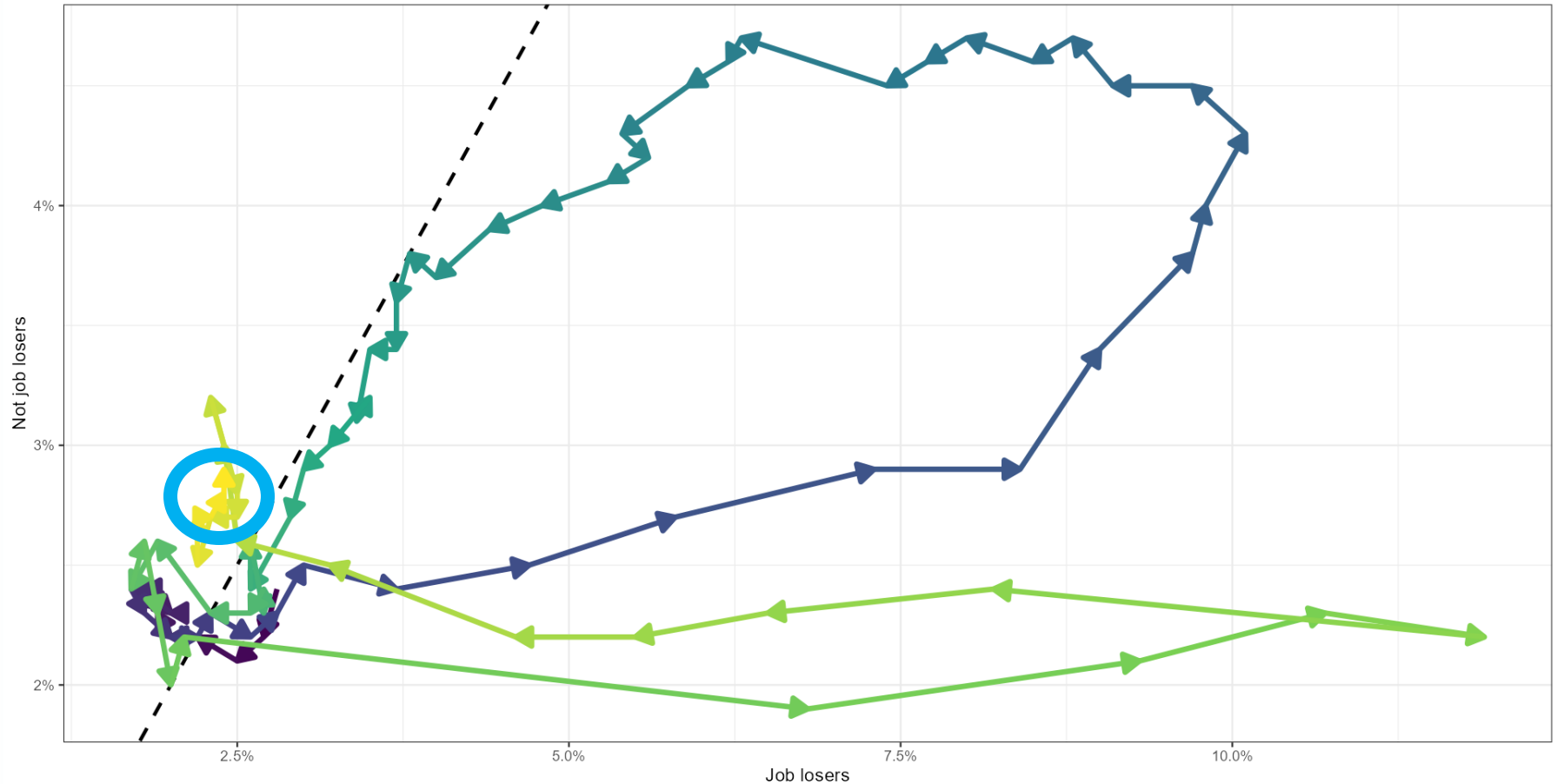

Dashed line where job loss = non-job loss unemployment, arrows at one quarter increments

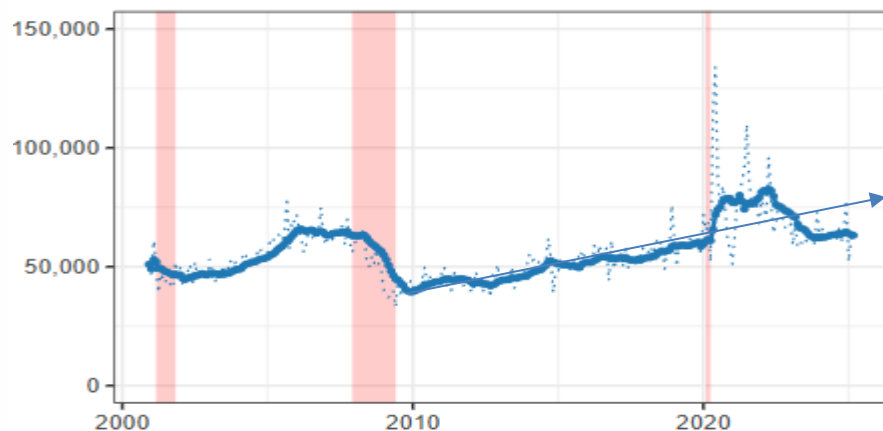

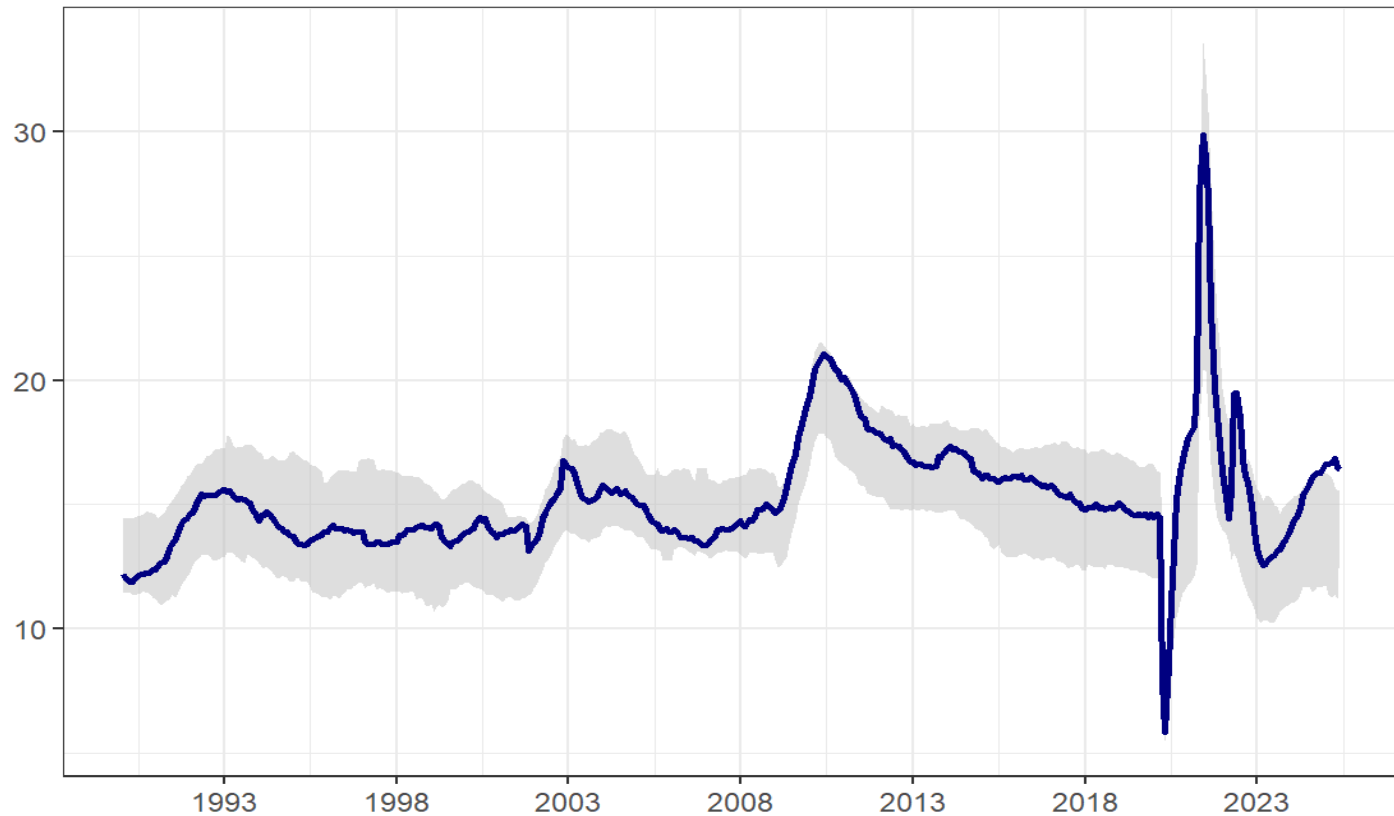




# Claims Level but Job-Finding Slowing

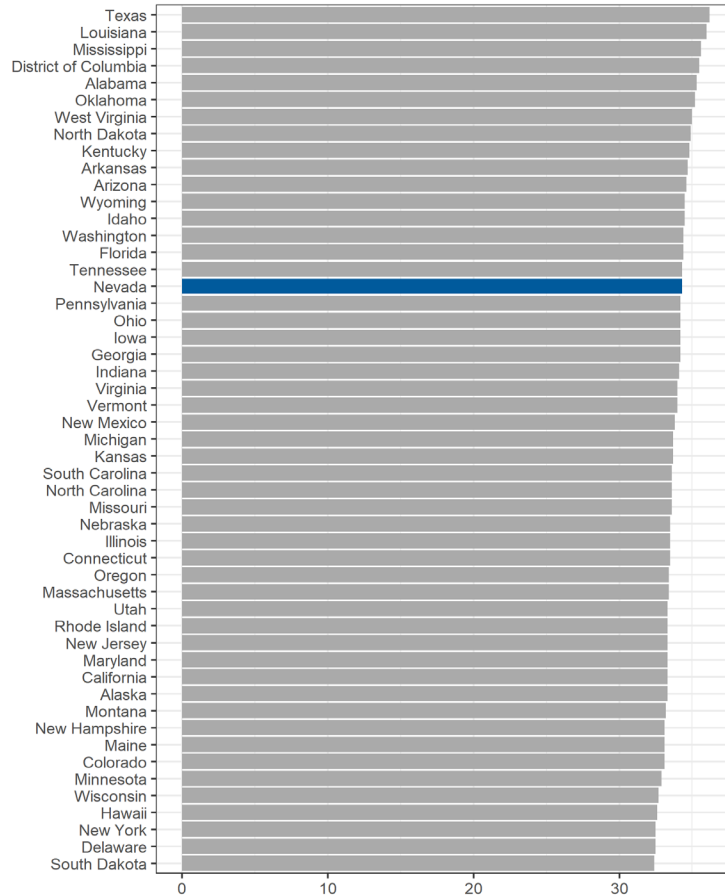

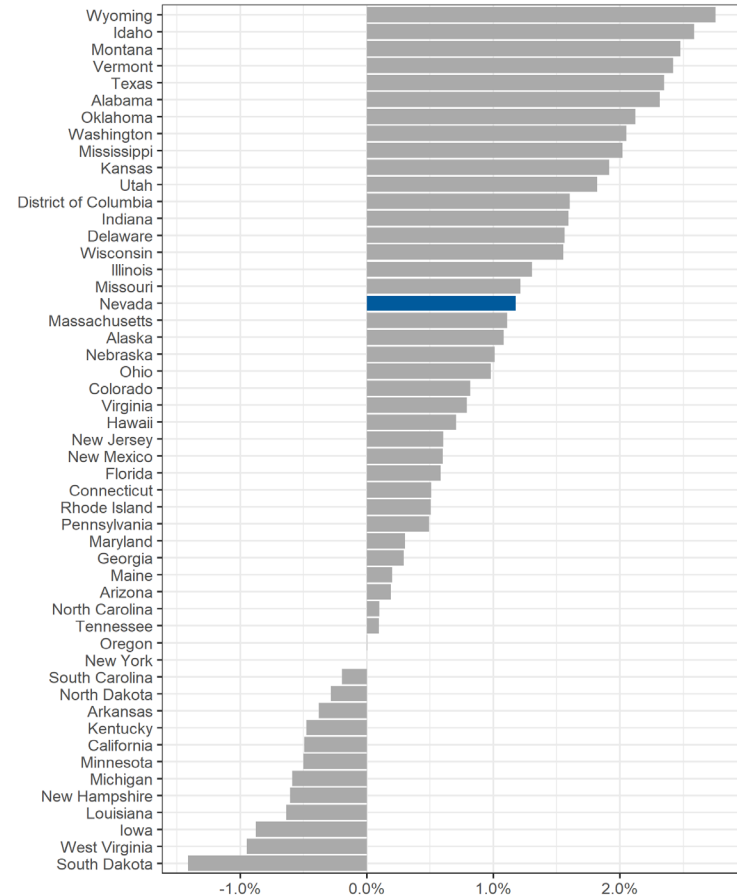

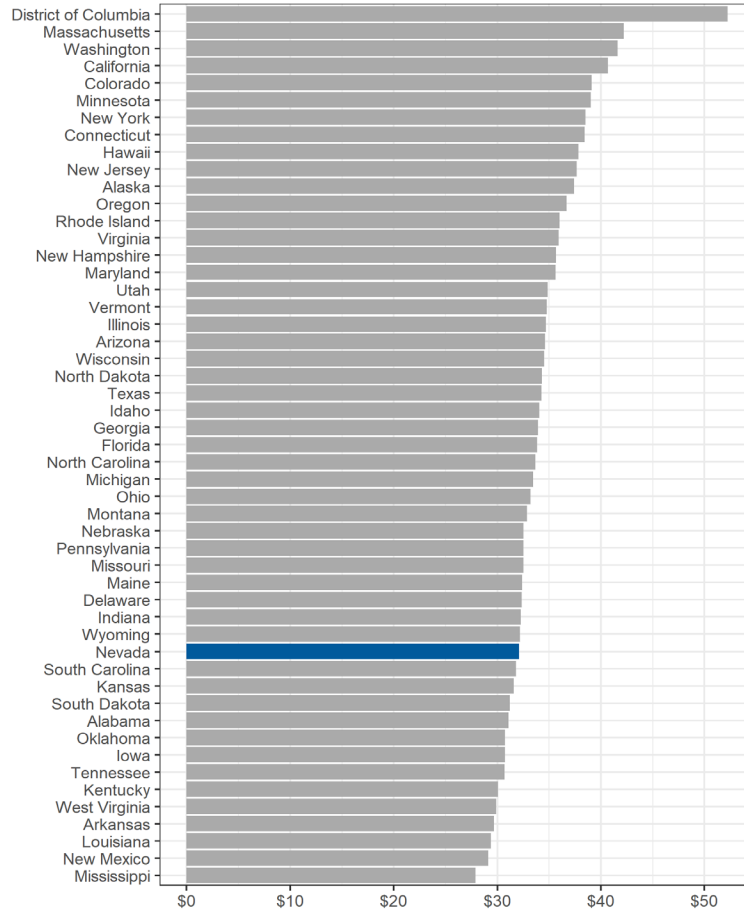

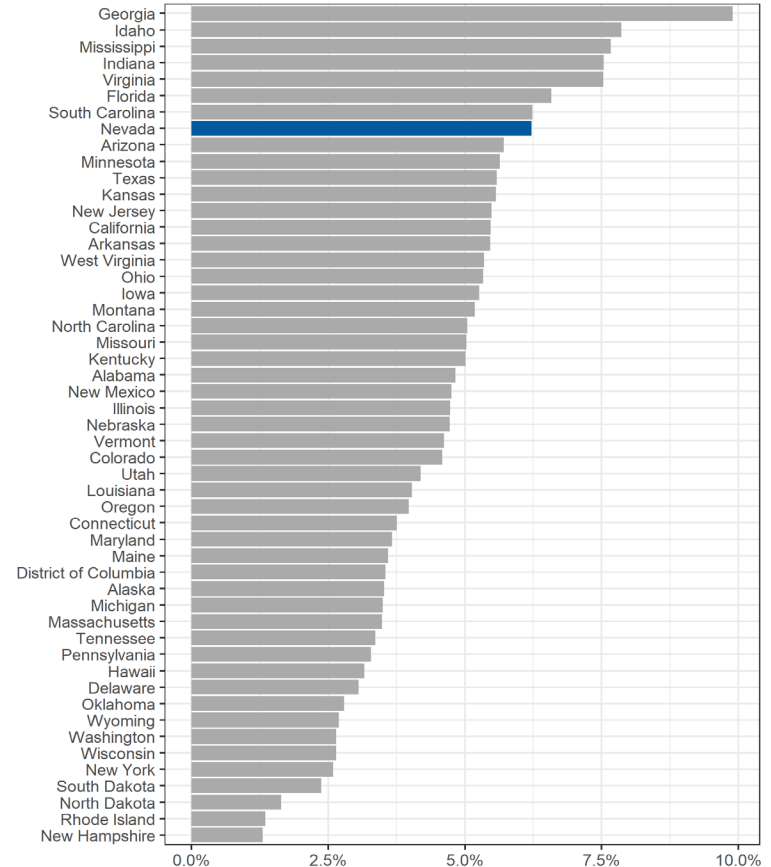

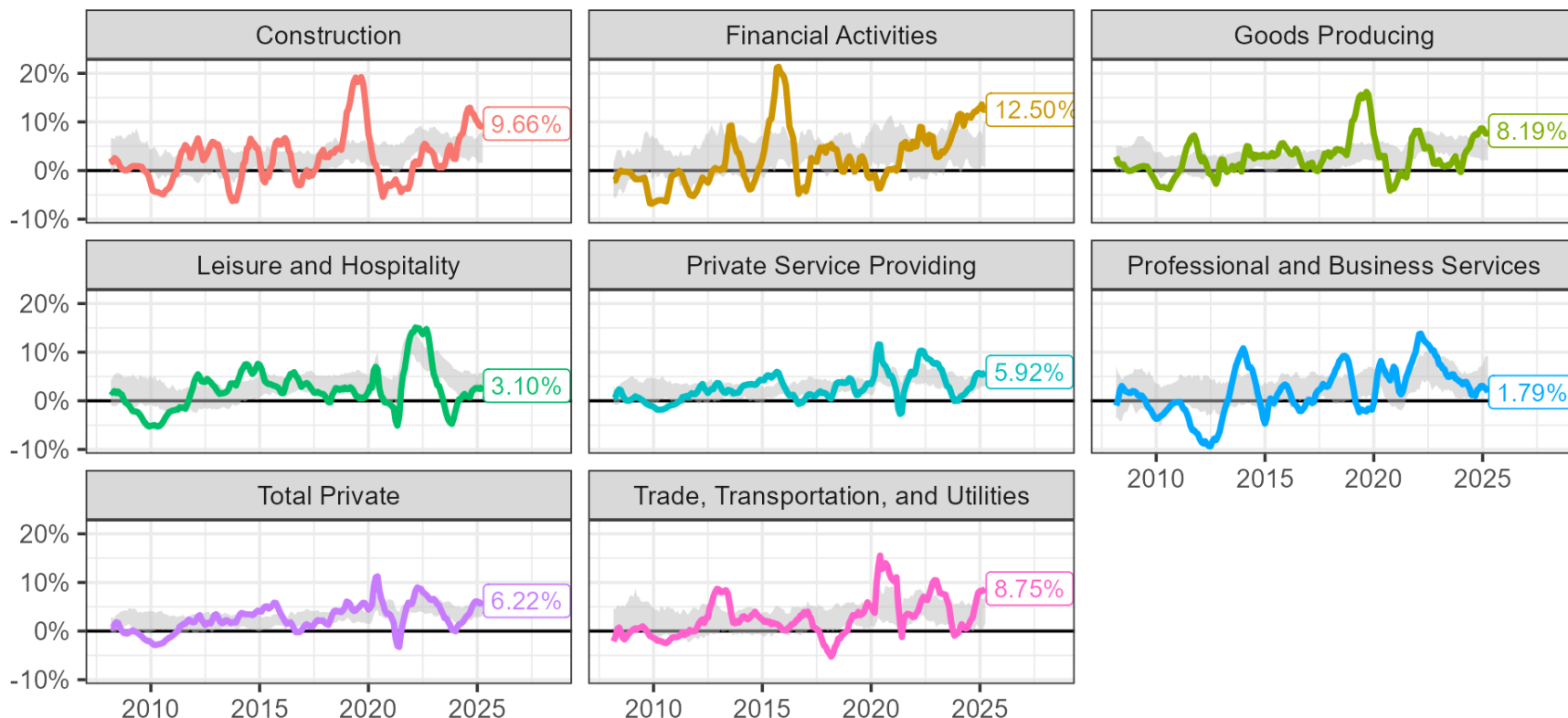

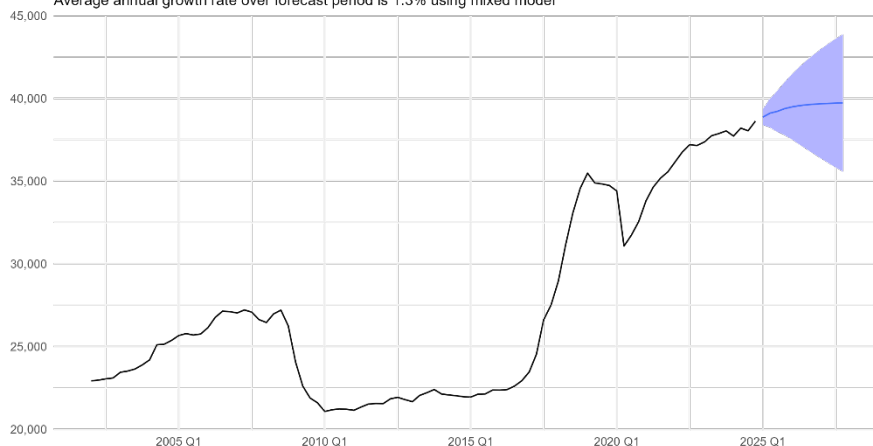

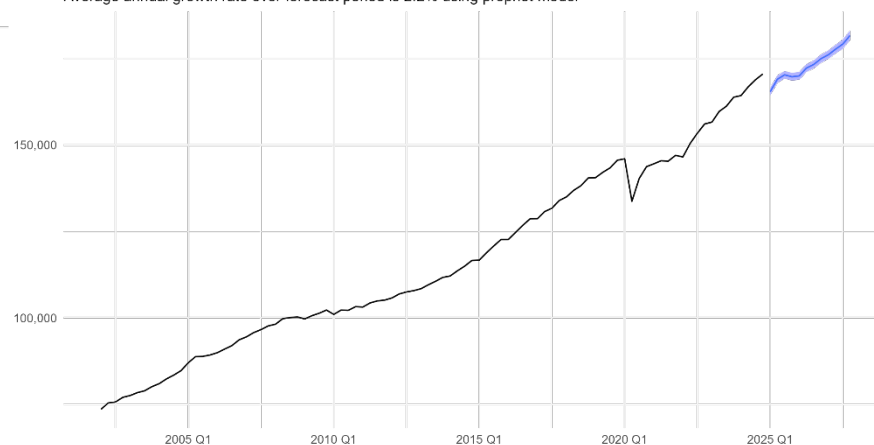

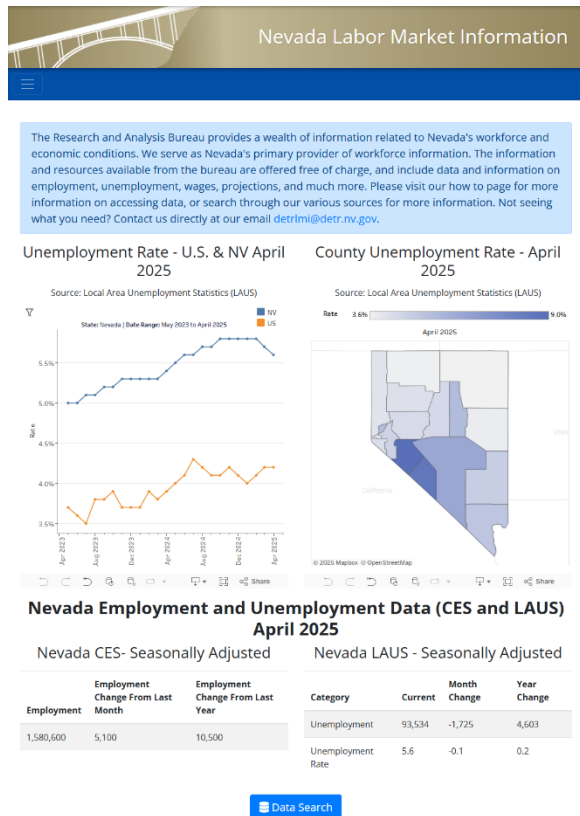

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## Nevada Statewide & Metro Area Labor Market Overview

April 2025

Published on May 15, 2025

In April 2025, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Nevada decreased by 0.1 percentage points (pp) and now sits at 5.6 percent. The labor force grew by 4,041 over the month. This increase in labor force was the result of an increase of 5,766 in employed individuals and a decrease of 1,725 in unemployed individuals.

There was an increase of 5,100 in the number of jobs in the state of Nevada, as indicated by the April Current Employment Statistics (CES) numbers. The largest gains were seen in Leisure and hospitality, Professional and business services, and Education and health services with increases of 3,200, 1,900, and 1,000, respectively. Meanwhile, Construction saw a decrease of 1,400 jobs.

The Las Vegas MSA saw an increase equivalent to 2,700 jobs (or 0.2%) over the month. Meanwhile, the Reno MSA saw an increase of 800 jobs (or 0.3%). Finally, the Carson City MSA saw an increase of 200 jobs (0.6%)

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## Counties and Cities Employment & Unemployment

April 2025

In April 2025, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Nevada decreased by 0.1 percentage points (pp) from 5.7 percent to 5.6 percent. The unadjusted rate went down by 0.4 pp from 5.4 percent to 5 percent. The number of employed individuals in the state went up by 5,766.

At the Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) level, the state saw a decrease in unemployment rate in all three of its MSAs. In the Las Vegas MSA, the state saw a decrease in the unemployment rate equivalent to 0.4 pp, moving from 5.6 percent to 5.2 percent. The Carson City MSA saw a decrease of 0.4 pp, going from 4.4 percent to 4.0 percent. The Reno - Sparks MSA saw a decrease of 0.5 pp from 4.7 percent to 4.2 percent. These figures are not adjusted for seasonality.

At the county level, the state saw decreases in the unemployment rate in all its counties but one. The counties with the largest decreases were Elko, Pershing, Lander, and Mineral with decreases of 0.7 pp, 0.7 pp, 0.6pp, and 0.6 pp, respectively. Meanwhile, Esmeralda County saw an increase in the unemployment rate of 0.7 pp.

Figures for state unemployment estimates come from the Local Area Unemployment Statistics (LAUS) program, a state/federal partnership sponsored by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS/LAUS). This program produces Nevada Demographics Report

National Hires Rate



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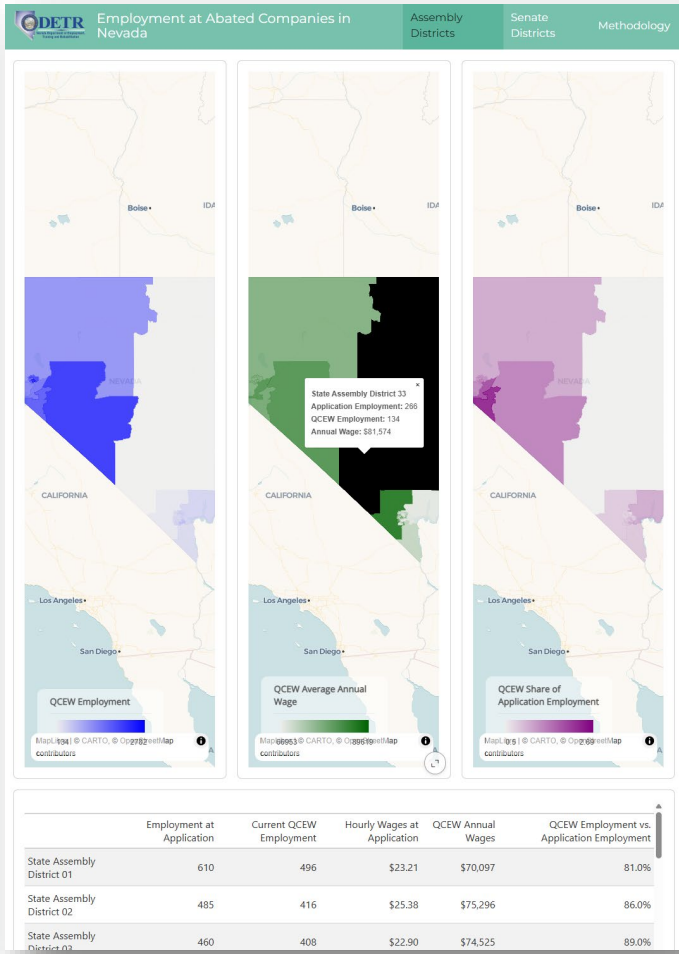

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## Summary of Federal Employment in Nevada

This report uses data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and the U.S. Department of Labor to look at both overall levels of federal employment in Nevada and to look at claims for unemployment insurance from federal workers in Nevada, as well as providing resources to individuals about such claims.

The largest federal departments with workers in Nevada as of the third quarter of 2024 are:

1. Department of Veterans Affairs (6,317)
2. US Postal Service (4,818)
3. Department of Defense (2,958)
4. Department of the Interior (2,196)
5. Homeland Security (2,140)

## Concentration of Federal Employment by County

Data from the [Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages](#) allows us to look at the counties in Nevada with the largest concentrations of federal workers. This does not include active duty military personnel, but does include civilian employment at military bases, so Churchill County, home of the [Naval Air Station Fallon](#) and Mineral County, home of the [Hawthorne Army Depot](#) have above-average concentrations of federal employees, each among the 250 counties in the nation with the highest concentrations of federal workers.

In all, 11 of Nevada's 17 counties have a higher concentration of federal workers than the typical county, and 6 of these have higher concentrations than the overall national share of federal employment to all workers.

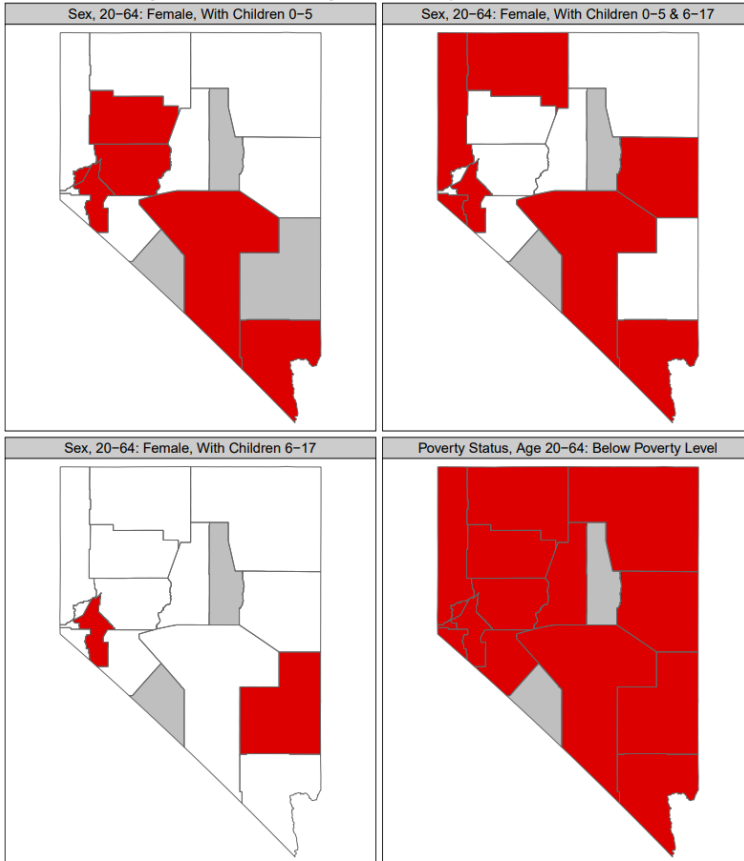
